Using Jhumpa Lahiri, Mark Twain, Ta-Nehisi Coates and others as our models, you will be publishing these short stories and reading them at exhibition on March 19th in our student-built-and-run coffee house, in an attempt to lead discourse on the implications of our consumer culture.
